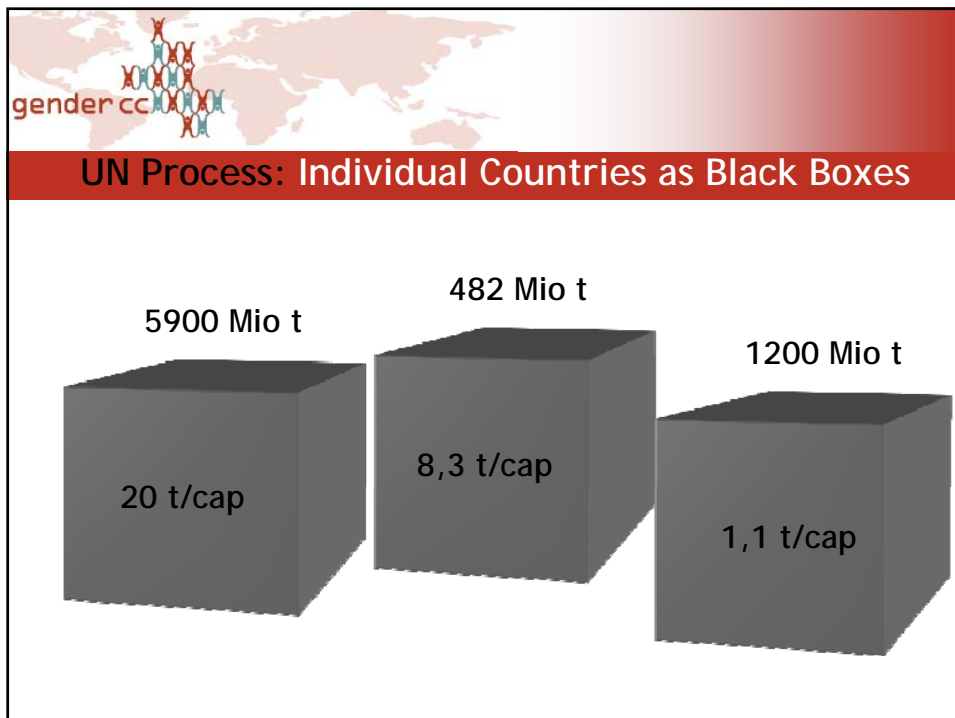

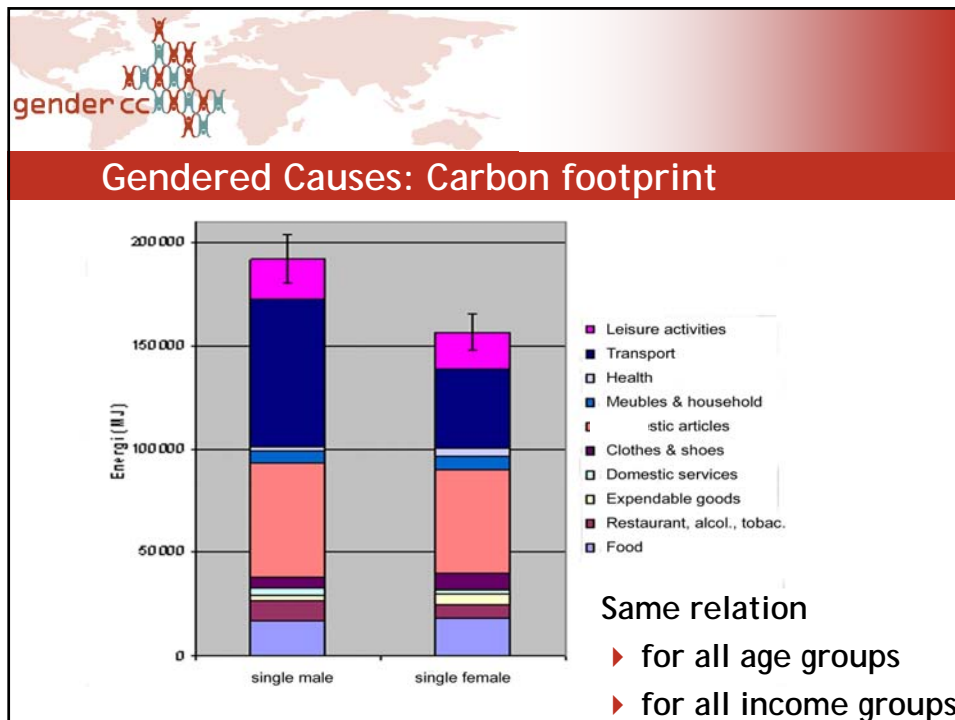

Gendered causes of climate change

- ▶ Social roles
- ▶ Gendered division of labour and responsibilities
- ▶ Income gaps

Gendered impacts

- ▶ **Different impacts** (social roles, gendered division of labour, access to credits and land)
- ▶ **Higher vulnerability** of women (poverty, lower education, physical, cultural, legal constraints)

Mitigation: Attitudes towards, and Impacts of Solutions




- ▶ Higher risk perception of women in general e.g. nuclear power, CCS, GM
- ▶ Perception of climate change and climate change policy
- ▶ Priorities: lifestyle changes versus technologies
- ▶ Policy options and their impacts: e.g. market based options discriminate women (income gap, less access to markets)

Adaptation



- ▶ Participation in decision-making and planning
- ▶ Access to information and education
- ▶ Access to funding



Women in the UNFCCC process



- ▶ GenderCC network started 2003 (COP9)
- ▶ Growing number of women's organisations accredited
- ▶ Growing attention to gender issues in the Global South
- ▶ Bali position papers on Future Commitments, Financing, Forest, Agrofuels
- ▶ Goal: Gender mainstreaming included in the Copenhagen outcomes
